Why This Can't Wait for School

AI shows up in games, search, homework helpers, and social apps — often before anyone explains what it is.

It's a foundational skill

Like reading or typing, knowing how to use AI well is becoming a basic part of learning and work.

Judgment beats blocking

Teaching wise use protects them far better than pretending it isn't there.

THE ESSENTIALS

What Every Kid Should Understand

AI can be wrong

It sounds confident even when it's mistaken. Teach them to double-check, especially for schoolwork and facts.

It's a tool, not a friend

It has no feelings and doesn't truly "know" them. It's fine to use — but it isn't a person to confide in.

Private things stay private

Never type in full names, addresses, school, passwords, or photos. If it's private offline, it's private online.

Using ≠ cheating

AI to *learn* and brainstorm is smart; AI to *do the work for you* is not. Know the line.

BY AGE

What to Focus On, When

AGES 5–8

Curiosity & Supervision

- › Use AI together, side by side
- › "The computer is guessing, not thinking"
- › Keep it playful — stories, drawings
- › No solo accounts or private chats

AGES 9–12

Rules & Skepticism

- › Teach "check it before you trust it"
- › Set clear family rules for use
- › Never share personal details
- › Use it to learn, not to copy

AGES 13–17

Ethics & Independence

- › Honesty: cite AI help, don't hide it
- › Spot deepfakes, scams, and bias
- › Balance AI with their own voice
- › Talk about privacy & digital footprint

GROUND RULES

A Simple Family AI Agreement

- ✓ **Ask before you share:** No names, photos, addresses, or passwords go into any AI.
- ✓ **Check important answers:** If it matters for school or safety, confirm it somewhere else.
- ✓ **Do your own thinking first:** Try it yourself, then let AI help you improve.
- ✓ **Be honest about help:** Tell a teacher or parent when AI helped with your work.
- ✓ **Tell a grown-up if it feels wrong:** Anything scary, mean, or too personal — come talk to us.

STAY ALERT

What to Watch For

- ! **Oversharing:** Kids may not realize typing personal details into a chatbot isn't private.
- ! **Believing everything:** Confident wrong answers can mislead — especially on homework and health.
- ! **Over-reliance:** Leaning on AI for every answer can stall real skill-building. Keep effort in the loop.
- ! **Deepfakes & scams:** Fake images, voices, and messages are easy to make. Teach healthy doubt.

START THE CONVERSATION

Questions to Ask Together

"How do you think this app knows what to say?"

"Is using AI here helping you learn or doing it for you?"

"How could we check if that answer is true?"

"How could someone use this to trick people?"

"What should we never tell a chatbot?"

"What's something only a human can really do?"

"Raise a kid who uses AI thoughtfully, not one who fears it or leans on it. Curious, careful, and kind beats fluent every time."

You don't need every answer. Learning it alongside them is one of the best things you can do.
